Issue No 132

The National & Provincial Building Society Building Clifton Street, Lytham, now the Santander Bank

The last issue of the Antiquarian (No 131 page 5) showed a photo of the Building Society's building. After seeing the photo our President Audrey Kirby said she used to have an account there when it was a bank rather than a building society so a further look is of interest. It also highlights the vast changes in the British high street banking system which has been visible in our own town centres in recent years.

After the amalgamation with the Westminster Bank, the National Provincial Bank was rebranded to National Westminster as can be seen in the photo (right). The concrete lamp posts which replaced the old tram pole lamps were not the best looking but show the 1960s style well. (photo LHG)

Audrey had banked at the National Provincial Bank and remembers it changed to the National Westminster Bank. There was however no connection other than the building itself with the later occupant, the National & Provincial Building Society.



The National Westminster Bank was established on 1st January 1970 when the corporate name of the three high street banks involved in the amalgamation were officially changed following what must have been considerable preparation work after their merger two years earlier in 1968. The National Provincial Bank and the Westminster Bank

joined forces and this included the District Bank which had been a subsidiary of the National Provincial since 1962 although it retained its own identity until 1970.

The banking groups involved were all well over 100 years old. The National Provincial Bank had been founded in 1833 as the National Provincial Bank of England. The Westminster Bank had been founded

as the London County & Westminster Bank in 1834, later of course dropping the London County from its title. The District Bank was the oldest of the three, only just though, having been founded in 1829 as the Manchester & Liverpool District Bank. The National Westminster however lasted as a separate entity for only 30 years before it was bought by the Royal Bank of Scotland Group in 2000 although it retains its own identity.

The National & Provincial Building Society who took over the NatWest's Clifton Street branch did not have such historic origins being an amalgamation in 1982 of the Provincial Building Society and the Burnley Building Society. The Society lasted only 14 years before being taken over by the Abbey National in 1996, itself being bought out by Santander in 2004.

The photo from our Archives shows that the Clifton Street building had been re-branded to the National Westminster name. At the same time the District Bank in the Square (actually 9 Dicconson Terrace) was also re-branded to National Westminster, later of course under the trading name NatWest. With two branches of the same bank in the same town centre plus the former District Bank at the top of the bridge in Woodlands Road also re-branded, it became inevitable that one would close but nobody could have foreseen back then that there would come a time when all three would be closed but with the advent of electronic banking times have changed.

Lytham Cricket Club 1855

Lytham Cricket Club was founded in 1855 by Squire Clifton of Lytham Hall. In 1946 Lytham joined the Manchester & District Association having been involved in playing friendly matches for the previous 91 years.

Lytham Hall estate of which the cricket ground was part, was sold by the squire to the Guardian Royal Insurance Company in 1963. In 1967 the club became a multi-sports club incorporating cricket, tennis, hockey and soccer. The club purchased the ground in the late 1980's thus





ensuring that cricket would be played at Lytham in perpetuity.

First Class cricket came to Lytham in the early 1980's even though benefit matches &t 2nd XI County Championship matches had been held earlier. The first County Championship match was held in 1985, the visitors being Northampton CCC. Since that date regular 1st and 2nd XI county matches have been held at Lytham when the ground takes on a festival atmosphere firmly establishing Lytham as one of the favourite out grounds in Lancashire.

Lytham CC left the Manchester & District Association in 1997 as champions and joined the expanding Liverpool Competition. In 1999 Lytham were





promoted to the Premier Division as that season's 1st Division champions.

The Liverpool Competition was accredited as an ECB Premier League for the season 2000 thus ensuring that Lytham had achieved one of its objectives by becoming a founder member of the ECB Premier League.

The Liverpool Competition ECB Premier League is considered to be one of the top 4 ECB Leagues in the country. The league team won the League Cricket Conference Presidents Trophy in both 2002 & 2003 beating the Durham Premier League and the Nottinghamshire Premier League respectively.

Lytham CC is now considered to be one of the top 5 strategic clubs in Lancashire. We are also one of the top 200 clubs in the country, being Clubmark accredited in May 2003 and CCDF registered in September 2003.

In 2003 we were also acknowledged as BBC Community Club of the Year for Fylde with Steve Perkins also being honoured as Coach of the Year for Fylde.

Our junior section is the largest in the area and has the highest number of ECB qualified coaches in the vicinity. The junior teams play in the Palace Shield junior section. We run a Kwik Cricket section from age 8 and currently field 8 junior teams in the league, 3 at under 11, 3 at under 13 and 2 under 15.

Our juniors over the age of 15 play in the senior teams at their appropriate level. Many of our juniors play in the league representative teams and are expected to play in the newly formed Borough teams. Lytham CC is an active member of the Fylde Borough Council Cricket Development Group and through this organisation delivers coaching to schools in the locality.

We are also closely involved in the LCB Lancashire Cricket Partnership which strives to bring together the top clubs in the region in order that they may exchange ideas and gain support from the LCB. Dave Hoyle

We are still going through the War Memorabilia we have amassed over the years in the Archive with Andrew Whiteside who has been a great asset to the group. David Price and his sister Janet and also John Jameson have all been working hard with our many visitors.

Without their dedication the Archive would not be as popular as it is.

Lytham Heritage Group and Lytham Institute

Below is the document put together in September after an Executive Committee meeting. This included the thoughts and actions of other organisations and individuals. What happens next is still a waiting game but Fylde Borough is looking into Trust status for the building. I am sure when that is obtained we will see progress.

Aims:-

1. To play a key role by providing a Heritage Archive within the building to augment the fundamental reason why the building was gifted to the town in the first place.

2. To support the organisation who will be tasked with the running of the Trust.

3. To be active, through representation, in the decisions of the future of the building as a whole.

Outcomes of discussions so far :-

Following a special meeting of the Executive Committee on September 2nd 2019 and culminating in an extensive discussion, after months of considering the future, the following points were put forward.

• It was agreed, for a variety of reasons, that the Archive staying in the Institute building was to be our main focus. As we are a small group as far as membership is concerned and we run four separate venues – two museums in Fylde's wonderful buildings, the current Archive and the Heritage Centre for popular Art Exhibitions, in other aspects we are only able to offer a supporting role.

• David Hoyle our Archivist put forward lots of ideas about a future Archive to enhance not only the experience but preserve what we have for generations to come. He feels as it is the main source of historical data in the town it needs to be centrally placed and more readily accessible. He has put his ideas in more detail as a separate document but it was agreed that most costs associated with refurbishment of any future Archive would be met by Lytham Heritage Group. It at the very least will necessitate a change of room/s hopefully more area as the Archive is expanding.

• Another topic which needed consideration was how the building could be used for both commercial inputs in order to support the running costs associated with any Community Hub and other uses. The former we felt was outside our area of expertise such as raising funds for building refurbishment and businesses which would find both the position and the extensive space attractive.

• However we did put forward several ideas as to how the rest of the building could be used and even bring in extra income. Again David Hoyle has lots of possible income streams. In the meeting a few were discussed as being of importance in any Community building.

• The first was a community space which could be booked for events such as fundraising for a charity or a group wanting a space to meet on a regular basis. Also as the new Lytham Library area is small they may not be able to put on a full range of activities in their space so occasionally could outreach.

• Hopefully the Arts in its widest sense would be well represented with facilities for classes, an exhibiting space although we would be retaining our Exhibition space at the Heritage Centre and last but by no means least a space for the LSA Art Collection. We have a wonderful and valuable collection hidden away in a cellar and it rarely sees the light of day. In this modern age there is no reason why a virtual gallery could not be formed with set up costs but no worries over insurance and security.

There will be a lot of discussion in small groups and no doubt larger public forums as after all this is a community building and people need to have a say. The Lytham Heritage Group has always supported financially local heritage linked projects such as our ongoing support of Lythamís Rose Queen and historically Lytham Hall and Lytham Town Trust and sees no reason not to do so in any future Trust for the Lytham Institute.


