As we approach a hopefully "normal" can I thank all our volunteers and Committee members for all the hard work they have, and will be, putting in this year throughout all we do and hope to see many of you Sue Forshaw in the coming months.

Lytham Hall Billiard Room Reopened

After weeks of hard work our Billiard Room is finally finished and we are over the moon with the result.

This room had to be taken off the tour a couple of years ago due to the roof lantern being so problematic. Thankfully the roof work was completed last Autumn and the large timber lantern is now repaired and watertight after costing around £19,000.

We couldn't start on the interior of the room until the roof was fixed and until the Christmas period had passed. Early this January a local company "Finelines" started work on the interior, repairing the walls and tackling the huge task of redecoration. This was all completed at the start of February.

The Billiard Room at Lytham Hall was added in the late 19th century by forming an extension to part



of the Jacobean building at the rear. The work was commissioned and completed by John Talbot Clifton (the explorer). At this time the Arts & Crafts movement was in its early stages, which is evident in the design.

The room was refurbished again in the early 20th century by adding the beautiful stain glass windows and perhaps the remodelling of the fireplace. These influences have been vital in striking a balance and creating an interpretation of a gentleman's games room of this period.

The colours were there to be seen, from the green tiles on the fireplace, the green leathers on many of the original chairs, and the green and aubergine colours of the carpet. With careful paint archeology we started to uncover certain shades that had been used in the past.

The colours were matched to the National Trust endorsed "Little Greene" company paint cards. Every shade used is of exactly the period and supplied by the conservation paint experts "Little Greene".

One of the masters of the Arts & Crafts movement was William Morris, so it was only right to include some of his fabrics into the equation to help emphasise the architecture and period of the room. The 1901 seaweed pattern was selected to compliment the colour scheme, as well as the theme having links to a seashore town.

The dreadful late 20th century strip lights have also been replaced with brass art nouveau and cut glass fittings. These fluorescent lights were not just ugly, they were high on our risk assessment, therefore we are so glad to have eradicated them from the equation. Thanks are due to the team from Threlfall electrical contractors for their help.

Special thanks go to Lytham Hall volunteers Peter Burke, Janet Pothecary and Joe Mallabone who have helped enormously, especially in preparing the bay

windows and stripping back the original brass window fittings.

With around £24,000 being spent in total - We hope you like it.

The Dunes

Once the largest building at the St. Annes end of the Fairhaven Estate was Dunes House, built in 1898 on the northwest corner of the Estate at the junction of Fairhaven Road and Clifton Drive. It had 12 bedrooms and was owned by Joseph Peers of St. Annes.

He originally intended it to be a school, but by 1903 it had become the Dunes Hydro. In 1906 the Estate Company refused a request from Peers to turn it into a convalescent home, though it eventually assumed that role when it was bought by the Bradford Rechabites Friendly Society in November 1921. The building was replaced by a block of flats – also named Dunes House.



In 2019 I received a call from Peter Anthony who was looking in a reclamation Yard in Preston for two Lions to grace the steps of Lytham Hall.

He stumbled across a large concrete stone and it read Dunes House 1898 and let me buy it without being seen . The stone arrived on a Pallet truck and weighed over a ton. It was 4 foot wide and 5 foot tall with a thickness of 9 inches, It remained where the driver dropped it off, I was expecting something far less that was maybe the size of something I could put into the boot of my car. How wrong I was.



My plan was to contact the Dunes and see if they would like it at their flats which still uses the Dunes name. There was very little interest and in the end it was decided that they would not have it which was a great shame.

Now I was stuck with a great lump of concrete which cost me the best part of £300.

Maybe it could go in the garden as a display of sorts?



Not with Ruth keeping it far away from her beloved lawn.

So what did become of the Name plaque of the Dunes House? Tony Ford said he would like it at the Station in St.Annes and would be happy to collect the piece. I let him have it at a loss but wanted to go to a good home so off it went.

Sadly after many months Tony told me the stone was too far gone and the stonework had worn away too much

Update on the stone. The stone is currently stored in a council depot.

A stonemason has looked at it and said he can't do anything with it but one of the station volunteers is investigating whether the stone, and particularly the all-important lettering could be recreated, perhaps in resin and/or fibreglass, by way of renovation. We haven't given up.

Heritage Centre Exhibitions Programme 2022



Past Talk on 14th March - Confessions of a Customs Officer

Brian Topping, who as a retired specialist Customs Officer based at Heathrow, gave a very interesting, informative and amusing talk on aspects of his work, mainly centred around drugs. This particular area of his working life was in the 70's when technology was not as sophisticated as it is now. It relied on the skills of the officer to spot likely suspects by the observation of body language, a 6th sense of something not "quite right", the countries passengers were flying from and thorough and careful investigation at the airport. Those who have ever tuned in to "Border Force" based in Australia and the USA will have seen the lengths drug smugglers go to.

He gave interesting examples some of which were based on a tip off/intelligence gathering that they used to secure the arrest. One story was a Miss World contestant from the Caribbean flying to London then Amsterdam and then the reverse. On the tip off she was stopped in London and the drugs were seized and she was jailed. Lessons like that are no deterrent as the stakes are so high for the smugglers. He gave specific examples of the methods they used some very sophisticated to attaching packets of drugs with gaffer tape to their bodies.

One question that was asked from the audience at the end was about the use of dogs. He does a part 2 of his talk which includes the use of dogs and I am looking at booking him for 2023 so watch this space!

Brian was actually the first speaker to use the new audio-visual system the Lytham Town Trust has set up in the Ribble Room. He was very impressed and as someone who does a lot of talks Brian declared it the best he had used. Many thanks to Damien and Leanne from LTT for taking advise from our Media Coordinator Phil Stringer and suppliers to come up with an easy-to-use and effective system.
